WHEREAS, Mercy proposes to provide Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) at the rate of \$150.00 per hour for 2022, \$160.00 per hour for 2023 and \$170.00 per hour for 2024; and

WHEREAS, Western would agree to pay Mercy for the proposed services at the above applicable rates, not to exceed \$41,580.00 in 2022, not to exceed \$44,100.00 in 2023 and not to exceed \$46,620.00 in 2024; and

WHEREAS, Mercy will continue to provide the required services as delineated in the existing agreement between the parties; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of Western hereby agree to enter into an emergency medical services agreement with Mercy along the terms and conditions as set forth above for a period from July 1, 2012 through December 31, 2024, and further be it





#### Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

#### **Opinions**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Western Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation (a New York public benefit corporation) (the Corporation) as of and for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Corporation's basic financial statements as listed in the table or contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the Corporation, as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the respective changes in financial position, and its cash flows thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Basis for Opinions**

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Corporation and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Corporation's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. #### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, the schedule of changes in total OPEB and related ratios, the schedule of proportionate share of net pension asset (liability), and the schedule of contributions - pension plans be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

#### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Corporation's basic financial statements. The accompanying operating expenses, statement of section 516 revenues and expenditure, summary of revenue and expenses by branch, capital acquisition fund - statement of net position, capital acquisition fund - statement of revenue and expenditures and change in net position, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated March 24, 2022 on our consideration of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited)
As of and For the Years Ended December 31, 2021 and 2020

Our discussion and analysis of Western Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation's (the Corporation's) financial performance provides an overview of the Corporation's financial activities for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. Please read it in conjunction with the independent auditor's report and the Corporation's financial statements.

#### **Financial Highlights**

The Corporation generated a net handle of \$68,366,397 in 2021, which represents an increase of \$11,715,269, or 20.7%, from the net handle of \$56,651,128 generated in 2020.

Video gaming operations had total credits played of \$913,409,150 and credits won by patrons of \$847,008,725 in 2021, resulting in a net win of \$66,400,425. Credits played represented a \$543,601,925, or 147% increase over the credits played of \$369,807,225 in 2020, while net win represented a \$39,789,229, or 149.52%, increase as compared to the net win of \$26,611,196 in 2020.

The Corporation acquired the Hotel at Batavia Downs in April of 2021, and during 8 months of OTB ownership generated \$1,308,428 in room revenue.

The Corporation generated revenue that provided for the following distributions, including certain statutory payments, in 2021; participating municipalities received \$5,.93,184; counties with racetracks, including Buffalo Raceway, received \$239,695; New York State received \$34,082,527; the racing industry (including direct commission payments to racing entities as payment for allowing WROTB patrons to wager on their races, the Agriculture and New York State Horse Breeding Development Fund and the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund, simulcast commission fees to select in-state racing entities, and statutory payments due to the Batavia Downs Purse Fund to help support live racing purses) received \$13,108,942; and Genesee County and Batavia School District pursuant to arrangements with those entities in lieu of paying property and school taxes received \$89,232.

In total, these distributions totaled \$53,313,580 during 2021 and were 124% higher than 2020 distributions. These distributions increased year over year in 2021 due to impacted operations related to the COVID-19 global pandemic in 2020, as well as, the positive impact the purchase of the hotel had with the increased volume of patrons on the gaming floor and in the food venues. Participating municipalities earned surcharge revenue of \$886,904 that is paid on a monthly basis and received earnings distributions of \$4,906,280 that is paid on a quarterly basis

The Corporation's total operating expenses increased \$11,789,109 to \$44,577,864, excluding the effect of postemployment health benefits expense and the expense related to the Corporation's participation in the New York State and Local Employees Retirement System (ERS). This increase is related to impacted operations related to the COVID-19 global pandemic in 2020. While operations were impacted, the Corporation worked with vendors to delay contractual payments and cut all non-essential operating expenses, including marketing campaigns, planned professional service agreements, travel expenses and branch cleaning contracts.

Total operating expenses, including postemployment health benefits expense and the effect of participating in the ERS were \$44,401,453 in 2021 as compared to \$35,641,517 in 2020.

#### Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited)

As of and For the Years Ended December 31, 2021 and 2020

Before accounting for the sale of assets, Branch Operations generated operational earnings of \$531,831 in 2021 as compared to a loss of \$4,144,690 in 2020. After recognition of the sale of assets, Branch Operations generated earnings of \$1,156,499 in 2021. The Batavia Downs facility generated earnings of \$7,539,615 as compared to losses of \$5,719,232 in 2020. Corporate earnings, including sale of assets, totaled \$8,717,779 as compared to losses of \$9,643,404 in 2020. For the year ended December 31, 2021, the Corporation reported revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities of \$6,452,983 as compared to \$722,740 in 2020.

#### **Basic Financial Statements**

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements that have been audited by independent auditors. The Corporation's financial statements are prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, as set forth by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). As such, the Corporation is required to use the accrual method of accounting, which recognizes revenue when earned and all expenses are recorded when they are incurred, regardless of when they will be paid. The comparative statements of net position are as of December 31, 2021 and 2020 and show the Corporation's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflow of resources, and undistributed net revenue. These statements indicate the resources available and the related obligations the Corporation must meet. The Corporation is a New York State public benefit corporation and, as such, all income derived from operations is distributed to state and local governments.

The statements of net revenue available for distribution, otherwise known as the income statements, show activities for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. Revenues are classified by source. Expenses are classified into the following categories: statutory payments, operating expenses, and other expenses. The difference between revenues and expenses, including non-operating revenue, special items, and the allocation to the capital acquisition fund is the net revenue available for distribution to the participating municipalities.

The statements of changes in undistributed net revenue for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 include reconciliations of the beginning and ending of the year undistributed net revenue for each participating municipality. These reconciling items include the net revenue (loss) allocated to each municipality, as well as the payments made by the Corporation to each municipality.

The statements of cash flows for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 disclose the nature of the Corporation's cash receipts and disbursements. These receipts and disbursements are separated into three activities: operating, capital and related financing, and investing activities. The cash flow statements separately report cash received from racing and gaming commissions, cash received from other sources, cash paid out to suppliers and employees (salaries), and statutory payments. These statements also show cash paid for the purchase of fixed assets, payments made on debt, and the distribution of net revenue to participating municipalities. The result is a reconciliation of cash held at the beginning of the year to cash heid at the end of the year.

The notes to the financial statements disclose the Corporation's significant accounting policies and provide detail of the major assets and liabilities such as property and equipment, debt, and the Corporation's postretirement benefits. The New York State and Local Employees' Retirement System (ERS) is described, as well as the Corporation's related funding policy and total costs. Also disclosed are future commitments of the Corporation, such as leases and major contracts. The notes include a definition of revenue and detail the allocation of revenue to the racing industry, participating municipalities, and New York State.

#### **Overall Financial Position and Results of Operations**

The Corporation's net handle in 2021 was \$68,366,397, an increase of \$11,715,269, or 20.7%, from handle of \$56,651,128 generated in 2020. The Video gaming segment realized a net win of \$66,400,425, an increase of 39,789,229, or 149.52%, from 2020. The Corporation had earnings from operations of \$8,071,446 in 2021, as compared to losses of \$9,863,922 in 2020 and earnings of \$2,374,985 in 2019. Noncash revenue associated with the Corporation's postemployment health insurance benefits and participation in the ERS was \$176,411 in 2021, as compared to expense of \$2,852,762 in 2020. This decrease in expense was due primarily to changes in the underlying assumptions related to GASB 68.

#### Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited)

As of and For the Years Ended December 31, 2021 and 2020

New York State law requires off-track betting corporations to distribute operating earnings to their participating municipalities on a quarterly basis. In accordance with these laws, the Corporation made quarterly distributions of \$4,906,280 in 2021, as compared to 2020 when it did not make any quarterly distributions to municipalities. In 2019, the Corporation distributed \$2,618,934 in the second, third and fourth quarters.

#### **Branch Operations -**

The Corporation's branch net handle was \$65,979,915 in 2021, which represented a \$9,932,40°. or 17.7%, increase from 2020 handle of \$56,047,508. The Corporation's 2020 branch handle represented a \$9,924,543, or 15.0% decrease from 2019 handle of \$65,972,051. Total net revenue from branch operations after statutory payments was \$10,410,406 in 2021, an increase of \$1,516,667, or 17.05%, from 2020. The Corporations parimutuel wagering continued to shift to Batavia Bets, the Corporations internet pari-mutuel wagering platform, in 2021 with \$18,910,343 in handle, an increase of \$1,276,863, or 7.34%, over 2020 handle of \$17,633,480, and \$6,074,352 or 47.32% over 2019 handle. The Corporation has implemented a new rewards program to entice patrons to wager with Batavia Bets instead of wagering on other ADW platforms. This increase from 2019 is related directly to the new rewards wagering program.

In 2021, branch expenses totaled \$7,311,674, which represented a decrease of \$648,638, or 8.1%, as compared to 2020. Branch handle increased by \$9,932,407 in 2021 as compared to 2020, resulting in increased revenues of \$2,759,879. This increase in handle and in total revenue from 2020 relates to operational challenges related to the COVID-19 global pandemic during 2020. The Corporation was able to decrease operational expenses during this time by closing un-profitable brick and mortar locations and consolidating handle to locations that are more profitable. Branches generated \$3,386,188 of net revenue from operations before general and administrative expenses, sale of assets, postemployment health benefits, and ERS pension expense in 2021, as compared to \$370,906 in 2020.

At the end of 2021, the Corporation owned 10, and leased 1 full-service brick and mortar branch location, contracted with 25 Ez-Bet Operator locations, and offered two account wagering options: Dial-a-Bet, where patrons can phone in wagers to live operators, and Batavia Bets, an internet wagering platform. At the end of 2020, the Corporation owned 10, and leased 1 full-service brick and mortar branch locations. At the end of 2019, the Corporation owned 14, and leased 3 full-service brick and mortar branch locations and contracted with 27 Ez-Bet Operator locations. The Corporation will continue to assess the profitability of these branch locations and react in the best interest of the Corporation.

As in past years, the Corporation continued its efforts in working with New York State lobbyist groups and the New York State government to facilitate change in the current legislative environment.

#### Batavia Downs Gaming Facility –

Patavia Downs Gaming generated credits played of \$913,409,150, which was an increase of \$543,601,925, as compared to 2020 credits played of \$369,807,225. After accounting for credits won of \$847,008,725, net win in 2021 was \$66,400,425, an increase of \$39,789,229, or 149.52%, as compared to 2020 net win of \$26,611,196. Revenue generated from operations, net of the marketing and capital funds was \$72,131,646, an increase of \$41,933,946 or 139% from 2020 revenue of \$30,197,700. The Corporation is required to pay 49% of its VGM net win to the New York State Gaming Commission, resulting in \$32,536,208 in payments during 2021, an increase of \$19,496,722, or 149.50%, above 2020 payments of \$13,039,486.

The subsidized free play allowance program, which allows the Corporation to set aside up to 15% of the net win to be used for free play by patrons, provided the Corporation with \$9,076,700 in 2021 as compared to \$3,994,437 in 2020.

Live Racing and inter-track wagering (ITW) at Batavia Downs in 2021 generated an additional \$2-386,482 in handle for the Corporation, which represented an increase of \$1,782,862, or 295.54%, from the handle of \$603,620 generated in 2020. 2020 handle represented a decrease of \$2,913,198, or 82.84% from handle of \$3,516,818 generated in 2019. Revenues generated, net of statutory payments were \$872,330 as compared to \$576,593 in 2020. The loss from racing and ITW in 2021 was \$784,522 as compared to the loss in 2020 of \$781,296 and \$856,656 in 2019.

Total statutory payments made in support of state and local governments and breeders funds from video gaming, live racing, and inter-track wagering totaled \$32,432,401 in 2021, an increase of \$19,629,940 or 153.32% from payments made of \$12,802,461 in 2020.

Payments to Western New York Harness Horsemen's Association (WNYHHA) and Horsemen Purses related to all Batavia Downs activity totaled \$6,245,427 in 2021, an increase of \$3,442,306 or 122.8% from payments made of \$2,803,121 in 2020.

The Corporation acquired the Hotel at Batavia Downs in April of 2021, and during 8 months of ownership, the hotel generated \$1,308,428 in room revenue. The Potel also contributed \$243,231 in bottom line earnings to the Corporation.

The combined racing/video gaming and hotel operating expenses of Batavia Downs were \$30,127,931 in 2021 as compared to \$18,650,013 in 2020 before post-employment health benefits, the costs of participating in ERS, and general and administrative expenses. The increase in expenses of \$11,477,918, or 61.54%, in 2021 is related to the cost saving measures undertaken in 2020 during the COVID-19 global pandemic.

#### Corporate General and Administrative Expenses -

In 2021, the Corporation's general and administrative expenses were \$7,138,259, which were \$959,829, or 15.55%, higher than 2020 expenses of \$6,178,430. The increase is directly related to the cost saving measures undertaker in 2020 during the COVID-19 global pandemic.

In 2021, the Corporation allocated 59% or \$4,211,573 of its general and administrative expenses to the Batavia Downs business segment, and 41%, or \$2,926,687 to the branch operations business segment. In 2020, the Corporation allocated 50% or \$3,089,215 of its general and administrative expenses to both Batavia Downs and to Branch operations.

Inclusive of all expenses, and the sale of assets, branch operations gained \$886,904 in surcharge, and \$29,938 of earnings for a total of \$916,842 of net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities in 2021, while Batavia Downs Gaming gained \$5,536,141 of net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities. In total, the Corporation had net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities of \$6,452,983 for 2021. This was an increase of \$8,881,943 over 2020 results of \$722,740.

In 2020, inclusive of all expenses, and the sale of assets, branch operations gained \$722,740 in surcharge, \$4,144,690 of losses for a total of \$722,740 of net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities, while Batavia Downs Gaming lost \$5,719,232 of net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities. In total, the Corporation had net revenue available for distribution to participating municipalities of \$722,740 in 2020.

The Corporation recognized an additional \$332,396 in non-cash expense related to the other postemployment benefits provided to its retirees. This was \$407,301 less than 2020 expense of \$739,697 and \$198,695 less than 2019 expense of \$531,091. This is due to changes in the discount rate, and other actuarial assumptions.

In 2021, the net effect of implementing the provisions of GASB Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions - an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 27 and GASB Statement No. 71, Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date related to the Corporation's participation in the ERS resulted in additional employee benefits revenue of \$508,807. In 2020, this adjustment resulted in additional employee benefits expense of \$2,113,065.

#### Capital Asset Activity

In 2021 and 2020, the Corporation expended approximately \$8,616,000 and \$820,000, respectively, on capital assets. In 2021, the Corporation purchased the Hotel at Batavia Downs, as well as, began construction on a warehouse at the Batavia Downs Facility, as well as, miscellaneous maintenance costs at Batavia Downs and owned OTB Branch facilities. In 2020, capital purchases centered around general maintenance of assets, as well as purchases maintaining patron and employee safety in the wake of the COVID-19 global pandemic.

The Corporation expects to complete the warehouse project during the 1st quarter of 2022 and will be working with the Town of Batavia to complete improvements along the outside of the Batavia Downs facility on Park Road. These improvements include, new tree-lined sidewalks, better lighting and a raised walkway for patrons to enter the facility from the Batavia Downs parking lot.

#### Long-Term Debt Activity

In August 2021, the Corporation issued a tax-exempt bond in the amount of \$26,400,000 which was purchased by institutional investors. The proceeds from the issuance of this bond were used to finance the purchase of the Hotel at Batavia Downs, finance the construction of a warehouse needed for Food & Beverage storage needs, and refinance of all the Corporation's outstanding bond/term loan debt. Under the terms of this tax-exempt bond, the Corporation is required to make semi-annual payments commencing December 2021 and terminating December 2041.

#### Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited)

At December 31, 2021, the Corporation had outstanding debt related to the 2021 Bond proceeds of \$26,105,000.

Once the Corporation closed on the sale of the 2021 Bonds, it did not have any outstanding long-term indebtedness that is senior to, or on parity with, the 2021 Bonds. The following is a description of long-term indebtedness outstanding related to 2020, which was repaid using a portion of the proceeds from the sale of the 2021 Bonds.

In September 2013, the Corporation issued a tax-exempt bond (Series 2013A Bond) in the amount of \$4,485,046, the proceeds of which were used to satisfy the outstanding liability of previously issued bonds (Series 2010). Also, in September 2013, the Corporation issued a second tax-exempt bond (Series 2013B Bond) in the amount of \$3,500,000. The proceeds from the issuance of the Series 2013B Bond were used to finance the upgrading and improvement of various areas within the Corporation's off-track betting and gaming facilities at Batavia Downs.

In June 2018 the Corporation paid off the Series 2013A Bond, months ahead of its scheduled maturity. The Corporation made principal payments on these bonds of \$101,604 and \$249,820 during 2020 and 2019, respectively. The outstanding balances on these bonds payable at December 31, 2020 and 2019 were \$1,276,888 and \$1,378,492, respectively.

In October 2013, the Corporation entered into a \$17,400,000 tax-exempt delayed draw term loan and a \$2,000,000 taxable delayed draw term loan. Amounts drawn under the terms of these term loans were used to pay the costs associated with the renovation of Batavia Downs. Principal payments on these borrowings commenced in July 2015.

The Corporation made principal payments of \$764,840 and \$817,063 during 2020 and 2019, respectively. The outstanding balances on these loans payable at December 31, 2020 and 2019 were \$14,930,571 and \$15,695,412, respectively.

In June 2019, the Corporation entered into a \$2,200,000 tax-exempt term loan with the Bank of Castile. These funds were used to pay the costs associated with renovating Batavia Downs 34 Rush and Fortune's restaurant, as well as renovating and updated Park Place.

The Corporation made principal payments of \$313,556 and \$344,304 during 2020 and 2019, respectively. The outstanding balance as of December 31, 2020 and 2019 were \$1,542,141 and \$1,855,696, respectively.

On April 30th 2020, the Corporation was approved for a Paycheck Protection Loan (PPP) through the Small Business Association (SBA) in the amount of \$3,151,700 to help combat the short term cash flow emergency presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. This loan helped to keep staff on payroll for the duration of its covered period and allowed for the Corporation to continue employee benefits for all employees throughout the entire pandemic. The Corporation sought, and obtained, full forgiveness from the SBA as the proceeds were used in accordance within the guidelines of the PPP.

#### **Budget Analysis**

In 2021, Batavia Downs' gaming operations had credits played of \$913,409,150, and credits won of \$847,008,725, resulting in net win revenue of \$66,400,425. This was \$9,660,425, or 17.03%, above the 2021 operating plan, and 149.52% higher than 2020 actual net win. The Batavia Downs Gaming operation has seen great success in 2021 as COVID-19 restrictions have been lifted and patrons felt more comfortable in the Batavia Downs Facility. The purchase of the Hotel at Batavia Downs has also helped operations as now the Corporation can streamline hotel operations with gaming operations and provide benefits to patrons that maximize their experience on property.

Batavia Downs Gaming net win revenue in 2020 was 56.36%, or \$34,388,804, below operating plan projections, and 57.07% higher than 2019 actual net win.

The Hotel at Batavia Downs room revenue for the months May-December was \$1,308,428. This was \$346,395 or 36.01% over planned room revenue of \$962,033. The Hotel also contributed \$243,231 in bottom line earnings to the Corporation, which is \$157,542 or 54.39% over planned bottom line earnings. The loosening of COVID-19 restrictions as well as being able to provide hotel rooms included with Batavia Downs promotions has seen a greater demand for hotel rooms than had been planned for.

The Corporations OTB pari-mutuel handle for 2021 was \$65,979,915 as compared to planned handle of \$59,050,000, a positive variance of \$6,929,915 or 11.74%. The Corporation closed 6 unprofitable brick and mortar locations in the 3rd and 4th quarters of 2020, and the pari-mutuel management team was able to transfer a significantly greater percentage of handle from these closed locations to OTB's current locations than was planned for. The 2021 operating plan anticipated a branch operating loss of \$1.3 million before postemployment insurance benefits and ERS pension expense. Pari-Mutuel operations produced earnings of \$1.1 million before these items, a \$2.4M positive variance. Contributing to this positive variance were an increased Market Origin Credit due to an increase in online wagering, and the greater percentage of handle retained after closing the six unprofitable locations mentioned above. The Corporation will continue in its efforts to streamline branch operations, modify hours of operations, close unprofitable branches, and increase the number of Ez-Bet sites.

OTB pari-mutuel handle in 2020 was \$56,047,508, as compared to planned handle of \$64,598,500, resulting in a negative variance of 13.24%. The 2020 operating plan anticipated a branch operating loss of \$3.4 million before postemployment insurance benefits and ERS pension expense. The actual loss for 2020 was \$2.6 million a positive variance of \$800,000.

With respect to Batavia Downs racing and inter-track wagering, combined net handle for live racing and inter-track wagering in 2021 was \$2,386,482, which was lower than projected net handle of \$3,150,000 by \$763,518 or 24.24%. Inter-Track Wagering was not permitted to fully operate until May 31st, 2021, leading to the negative variance to plan.

The combined 2020 handle was \$603,620, which was lower than 2020 projected handle of \$3,336,000 by \$2,732,380 or 81.91%.

Total general and administrative expenses in 2021 were \$7,138,259 as compared to planned expenses of \$6,604,507, a variance of \$533,752, or 8.08%. The Corporation experienced higher costs associated with professional services than had been planned for.

Overall, the 2021 operating plan projected earnings from operations before the effect of actuarial adjustments to reflect the costs associated with the Corporation's postemployment benefits and participation in ERS, to be \$1,396,291, as compared to actual earnings of \$8,541,368. After recognition of these actuarially determined expenses, the Corporation experienced earnings from operations in 2021 of \$8,717,779 as compared to planned losses of \$26,004.

#### Summary

2021 has been a very successful year for Western Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation. 2021 Earnings Distributions to member municipalities were the highest in the Corporations history since inception, while Batavia Downs Gaming net win set a record, and OTB pari-mutuel handle reached a mark not hit since 2018, even as the Corporation consolidates wagering locations. Acquiring the Hoter at Batavia Downs has allowed the Corporation to fully integrate the hotel into its gaming operations and create more opportunities to maximize the patron experience while on site at the facility. The Food & Beverage and Events departments continue to generate positive feedback from patrons and provide great service to the many conventions, weddings, trade shows and other events that utilize the Corporation's many event spaces.

The Marketing department is continuing to enhance the patron experience and increase patron loyalty to the Batavia Downs facility. This involves the review of the Players Club Tier platform to ensure patrons are receiving the applicable rewards based on their associated level of play, the review of marketing channels and digital marketing opportunities, and how the patron is welcomed to the facility. The Corporation continues to engage with patrons and seek their feedback, to provide a positive and fun filled entertainment experience while at Batavia Downs.

Looking forward to 2022, The Corporation is excited to partner with the Town of Batavia in a project that will overhaul the entirety of Park Road on the outside of the Batavia Downs facility, providing better lighting, tree-lined sidewalks, and a safer raised walkway that will allow patrons to cross park road from the parking lot.

In branch operations, Batavia Bets, the Corporation's internet wagering platform, and Ez-bet locations will continue to be important facets of the Corporation, as both offer cost effective ways to expand the racing and wagering side of the Corporation's business operations. During August of 2020, WROTB adjusted the rewards system related to wagering at Batavia Bets, with the goal of driving more business to the online platform.

The Corporation will continue its ongoing efforts to improve operations and reduce costs while enhancing revenues, proclability, and distributions to New York State and local governments. As part of this effort, the Corporation's management will continue to seek legislative changes that will reduce the statutory obligations imposed on the Corporation's operations. Any reduction in these obligations, as required by New York State, will significantly improve the financial performance of the Corporation.

The Corporation's economic growth continues to improve the economic environment of local governments, New York State government, and the racing industry. In 2021, the Corporation provided \$4,906,280 in surcharge and earnings distributions to municipalities; \$89,232 to local governments; \$239,695 to counties that host racetracks, \$34,082,527 to New York State in the form of Gaming Commission payments, tax, and regulatory payments, and \$13,108,942 to the racing industry, for a total of \$53,313,580 in distributions that support state and local governments, as well as the racing industry. Similar distributions in 2020 totaled \$23,842,431. In addition, the Corporation provides jobs to approximately 410 people in Western New York, and harness racing opportunities from late July through early December.

#### **Notes to Financial Statements**

December 31, 2021

#### 1. THE CORPORATION

#### **Branch Operations**

On May 16, 1973, Chapter 440 of the Laws of the State of New York (the Law) was amended to allow the formation of regional off-track betting corporations to operate a system of off-track pari-mutuel petting under the supervision of the New York State Gaming Commission (the Gaming Commission), formerly the New York State Racing and Wagering Board (NYSRWB).

On September 19, 1973, the Western Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation (the Corporation) was established as a New York public benefit corporation to operate a system of off track betting in a thirteencounty region of Western New York. In 1978, the Law was amended permitting Chyuga and Oswego Counties to join the Corporation.

#### **Batavia Downs Gaming Facility**

In 1998, the Corporation acquired the assets of Genesee/Monroe Racing Association, Inc., which operated the Batavia Downs Gaming Facility (Batavia Downs) in Batavia, New York. Batavia Downs conducts live harness racing under a license granted by the Gaming Commission. This license is subject to the Gaming Commission's approval and is renewable on an annual basis. In addition to harness racing, Batavia Downs simulcasts races to and from other racetrack facilities (inter-track wagering (ITW)) under a license granted by the Gaming Commission and agreements with the facilities to and from which races are simulcast.

#### Video Gaming Machines (VGMs)

As the result of New York State (NYS) legislation enacted in October 2001, NYS racing entities were granted the ability to conduct video gaming (VGM) operations from the New York State Division of the Lottery (the Lottery), which became part of the Gaming Commission. The Corporation, as the owner of Batavia Downs, was granted a license to conduct VGM operations in February 2005. The Corporation began its video gaming operations in May 2005.

#### Hotel at Batavia Downs

On April 30, 2021, the Corporation acquired the adjacent and connected 84-room boutique luxury hotel, The Hotel at Batavia Downs. The hotel features 40 double queen rooms, 40 king rooms and four suites, which overlook the Batavia Downs Racetrack.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Corporation's financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States as set forth by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

#### **Net Position**

Generally accepted accounting principles require the classification of net position (undistributed net revenue) into three components - net investment in capital assets, restricted, and unrestricted. These classifications are defined as follows:

#### **Notes to Financial Statements**

- Net investment in capital assets This component of net position consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets. If there are significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end, the portion of the debt attributable to the unspent proceeds is not included in the calculation of investment in capital assets, net of related debt. Rather, that portion of the debt is included in the same net position component as the unspent proceeds.
- Restricted net position This component of net position is a result of external constraints praced on its
  use imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, laws, or regulations of
  other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling
  legislation.
- Unrestricted net position This component of net position consists of net position that does not meet the definition of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets."

The Corporation has adopted a practice of generally utilizing restricted funds, when available, prior to unrestricted funds.

#### **Racing Operations' Revenue**

Revenue related to the Corporation's racing operations consists of the following components:

- Net Handle Net handle represents all amounts wagered, less amounts returned to bettors due to either race cancellations or horses scratched in races in which they had been entered.
- Racing Revenue The Corporation's gross earnings on in-state racing are generally 18% of the total amount of applicable regular wagers handled. The Corporation retains 20% of applicable multiple wagers on races run at in-state tracks. A multiple wager is "a single bet or wager on two horses, evidenced by a single ticket and representing an interest in a single betting pool." The Corporation generally retains 25% of applicable exotic and super exotic wagers handled. An exotic wager is defined as "a single bet or wager on three or more horses, evidenced by a single ticket and representing an interest in a single pool." A super exotic wager is defined as "a single bet or wager on six or more horses, evidenced by a single ticket and representing an interest in a single pool." The Corporation retains varying percentages of out-of-state wagers, depending on the type of wager and the location of the racetrack.
- Surcharge Revenue NYS law imposes a surcharge of 5% on winnings of individuals who have placed wagers at the Corporation's branches and EZ bet locations.

In September 2007, Section 532 was further amended to provide that the applicable surcharge is payable to a harness track in Erie County through August 31, 2022. At the same time, Section 532 was amended to provide that 50% of the applicable surcharge is payable to Genesee County.

Uncashed pari-mutuel tickets represent outstanding winning tickets.

Lottery income is derived from a 6% commission earned on the sale of NYS Lottery tickets.

#### Video Gaming Machine Revenue

The Corporation's video gaming machine revenue represents a percentage of the VGM drop, which represents the net monies remaining in the video gaming terminals. The drop is VGM money played, less monies won by customers.

Payments to the Western New York Harness Horsemen's Association, Inc. (WNYHHA) purse fund and the Office of Racing Promotion and Development, formerly The Agriculture and NYS Horse Fund Breeding and Development Fund, are calculated at 7.75% and 1.25%, respectively, of the Corporation's monthly VGM drop. These payments are distributed from the percentage retained by the Corporation.

NYS legislation also provides for a percentage of the VGM drop to be segregated into a marketing fund. These funds can be expended on advertising and marketing promotions to enhance the Corporation's video gaming facility.

Effective April 12, 2019, NYS legislation was enacted that allowed the Corporation to retain, 37% of the total VGM drop. The Corporation is also allowed to retain an additional 14% of the VGM drop in its marketing and capital funds. The allocation of the total amount between marketing and capital is at the discretion of the Corporation.

#### **Statutory Payments**

The Corporation's statutory payments consist of the following:

- Track compensation Compensation is paid to in-state tracks based on statutory rates dependent on the type of wager and other contractual agreements. Compensation is paid to out-of-state tracks based on specific contractual agreements.
- Allocations to NYS Allocations to NYS consist of the following:
  - NYS wagering tax Pari-mutuel taxes are imposed on the amount wagered at rates determined by the type of wager, type of race, and location.
  - Unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets The Pari-Mutuel Revenue Law provides that 95% of the sum of unclaimed winning pari-mutuel tickets resulting from wagers placed by December 31 of a given year be paid to the State Tax Commission by March 15 of the succeeding year. The remaining 5% of such unclaimed winning tickets must be paid to that same commission by April 10 of the succeeding year.
  - NYS Gaming Commission regulatory fee The Corporation is required to pay 0.60% of monthly handle as a regulatory fee that is assessed on all state racing and wagering facilities.
  - Breakage Breakage represents revenues earned by the Corporation derived by the downward rounding of winning payouts. The Corporation pays 20% of the breakage derived from wagers on names races and 50% of the breakage derived from wagers on all other races as a statutory payment to the NYS Office of Racing Promotion and Development. The Corporation retains the balance of the total breakage.
  - NYS Gaming Commission The Corporation is required to pay 49% of the daily net video gaming machine win to the Commission for total VGM drop.

Breeding and development funds - From the total retained commission, the Corporation pays an amount
equal to 0.5% of daily pools derived from wagers on thoroughbred races, and 1.0% of daily pools derived
from wagers on harness races to the NYS Office of Racing Promotion and Development.

# **Distribution of Net Revenue Remaining to the Corporation**Racing Operations -

After payment of the Corporation's operating costs, the remaining net revenue is divided quarterly among the participating counties in accordance with the following provisions:

- 1. 50% of the revenues are distributed among the participating counties on the basis of the proportion of the pari-mutuel wagering accepted by the Corporation during the previous calendar quarter that originated in the Corporation's branch offices located in each participating county to total off-track parimutuel wagering accepted by the Corporation.
- 2. 50% of the revenues are distributed among the participating counties on the basis of population, defined as the total population in each participating county shown by the latest preceding decennial federal census completed and published as a final population count by the United States Bureau of the Census preceding the commencement of the calendar year in which the distribution is to be made.
- 3. A participating county containing a city electing to participate in the Corporation shall distribute revenues received to such city according to the propertion of such city's population to the county's population.

#### Batavia Downs' Operations -

After payment of the Corporation's operating costs, net revenues from pari-mutuel wagering and video gaming operations are distributed among the participating counties on the basis of population, defined as the total population in each participating county shown by the latest preceding decennial federal census completed and published as a final population count by the United States Bureau of the Census preceding the commencement of the calendar year in which the distribution is to be made.

#### **Operating Activities**

The Corporation presents as operating revenue, all revenue associated with on-going racing and gaming activities. This includes net racing handle, video gaming, surcharge, capital awards and food and beverage sales

#### Cash

the Corporation's cash consists of cash on hand and bank demand deposit accounts.

#### **Restricted Cash**

Under NYS law, the Corporation receives certain pari-mutuel commissions from both on and off-track betting. The Corporation is required to use these funds for harness racing capital improvements at Batavia Downs.

In accordance with NYS law, restricted cash also includes cash maintained in the Capital Acquisition Fund and the Batavia Downs Gaming Capital Awards Fund. These funds are to be used for financing the acquisition, construction, or equipping of the Corporation's offices, facilities, or premises.

In accordance with the Corporation's self-insured workers' compensation administrative agreement, the Corporation must maintain sufficient funds in a claims account to enable payment of claims and loss adjustment expenses.

The Corporation also maintains the following restricted cash accounts: advance deposit wagering accounts for individuals who elect to make wagers through internet/telephonic means; employee health and insurance related personal care accounts; funds held in conjunction with the Western New York Harness Horsemen's Association for purse distribution associated with live harness racing at Batavia Downs; and funds held for marketing/advertising expenses associated with the video gaming operations at Batavia Downs.

The Corporation also has restricted cash for the funds held in trust with US Bank associated with the 2021 Bond Refinance.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories consist of food, beverages, other restaurant supplies and inventories related to a small store located at Batavia Downs. These inventories are valued at cost.

#### **Capital Assets**

Capital assets are recorded at cost or fair value at the date of donation. The Corporation capitalizes additions greater than \$500 that have a useful life in excess of one year. Depreciation is recorded using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets that range from 2 to 25 years. Leasehold improvements are amortized at the shorter of their estimated useful life or remaining lease term. Impairment losses are recognized when the carrying value of an asset exceeds its fair value. The Corporation regularly assesses all of its long-lived assets for impairment.

#### **Postemployment Benefits**

The Corporation provides postemployment health insurance coverage to its retired employees and their survivors in accordance with the provisions of agreements between the Corporation and its employee groups. Substantially all of these employees may become eligible for these benefits, if they reach normal retirement age while working for the Corporation. The Corporation pays a variable percentage of the cost of premiums to an insurance company that provides health care insurance.

#### **Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources**

Deferred outflows of resources represent a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and will be recognized as an expense in that period. Deferred inflows of resources represent an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and will be recognized as revenue in that period.

#### Advertising

The Corporation expenses advertising costs as they are incurred. Advertising expense not rein bursed through the Corporation's marketing funds was approximately \$1,270,000 and \$540,000 during the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### **Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts eported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Income Tax Status**

As a New York public benefit corporation, the Corporation is exempt from federal and state income taxes, as well as state and local property and sales taxes, with the exception of sales tax associated with the sale of gift shop items, food and beverage at Batavia Downs.

#### 5. CASH AND INVESTMENTS

NYS law governs the Corporation's investment policies. In addition, the Corporation has adopted its own written investment policy. The Corporation shall maintain a list of financial institutions and dealers, approved for investment purposes and establish appropriate limits to the amount of investments which can be made with each financial institution or dealer. All financial institutions with which the local government conducts business must be credit worthy. Permissible investments include certificates of deposit, obligations of the United States Treasury and its agencies, repurchase agreements, and obligations of NYS or its localities. The Corporation's CFO is authorized to use demand accounts and certificates of deposit.

Collateral, which is held by a third-party agent or the pledging financial institution's trust department, is required for demand deposits and investments not covered by federal deposit insurance. The market value of the collateral is required at all times to equal or exceed the principal amount. Obligations that may be pledged as collateral are obligations of the United States and its agencies and obligations of NYS and its municipalities and school districts. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, all of the Corporation's cash deposits were either collateralized or FDIC insured.

#### 6. CAPITAL ACQUISITION FUND

The Corporation maintains a Capital Acquisition Fund (the Fund) in accordance with the Law for the purpose of financing the acquisition, construction, or equipping of the Corporation's offices, facilities, or premises. Effective July 1990, the Law mandated the imposition of a 1% supplemental surcharge on wagering pools of multiple, exotic, and super exotic wagers to be allocated to the Fund.

Contributions to the Fund from the Corporation's pari-mutuel wagering pools are subject to the following limitations:

- Contributions may not exceed 1% of the total pari-mutuel wagering pools for the quarter in which the contribution is made
- Contributions may not exceed 50% of quarterly net revenue payable to participating municipalities, exclusive of surcharge revenues.
- The balance of the Fund resulting from contributions of net wagering pools shall not exceed the lesser of 1% total pari-mutuel wagering pools for the previous twelve months or the undepreciated value of the Corporation's offices, facilities, and premises.

Amounts in excess of the above limitations may be subject to reclassification to net revenues payable to participating municipalities. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Corporation retained and designated \$127,429 and \$408,325, respectively, for capital acquisitions.

#### 7. CAPITAL AWARDS FUND

Effective April 2019, NYS legislation was enacted that provided the Corporation the ability to retain an additional 14% of the VGM drop for eligible marketing and capital expenditures. The allocation of the total amount between marketing and capital is at the discretion of the Corporation.

The unexpended balance of the Capital Awards Fund is recorded as deferred inflows of resources on the accompanying statements of net position until funds are utilized. The unexpended fund balance totaled \$8,354,657 and \$7,312,187 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. Capital Awards Revenue dollars available for expenditures at December 31, 2021 amounted to \$191,462. Due to the mandated closure of the Batavia Downs gaming floor, there were no Capital Awards Revenue dollars available for expenditures at December 31, 2020.

#### 9. LONG-TERM DEBT

#### **Direct Placement Debt - Bonds Payable**

In September 2013, the Corporation issued tax-exempt bonds (Series 2013B Bond) in the amount of \$3,500,000 that was purchased by a bank. The proceeds from the issuance of the Series 2013B Bond were used to finance the upgrading and improvement of various areas within the Corporation's off-track betting and gaming facilities at Batavia Downs. Under the original terms of the Series 2013B Bond, the Corporat on was required to make monthly payments of \$25,977, including interest at 4.03%, from October 2013 through September 2028. These bonds were repaid through a refinancing in the current year.

In August 2021, the Corporation issued a tax-exempt bond (Series 2021) in the amount of \$26,400,000. The proceeds from the issuance of the Series 2021 Bond were used to refund all the Corporation's outstanding 2013 Bonds, purchase and acquire the Hotel, reimbursing expenses incurred by the Corporation in connection with the Warehouse project, the funding of a Debt Service Reserve Fund as security for the Bonds, and the payment of certain costs associated with the issuance of the Bonds. The Bond has a maturity date of December 1, 2041.

#### **Direct Placement Debt - Term Loans**

In October 2013, the Corporation entered into a \$17,400,000 tax-exempt delayed draw term loan and a \$2,000,000 taxable delayed draw term loan with a bank. Amounts drawn under the terms of these loans were used to pay the costs associated with renovations at Batavia Downs. All amounts outstanding under the terms of these agreements are collateralized by the Batavia Downs gaming facility and certain branches. This term loan was repaid through a refinancing in the current year.

Amounts borrowed were payable to the bank over a 10-year term with a 20-year amortization. Under the terms of the agreement, the Corporation made payments of interest only on the unpaid principal balance of the loans throughout the construction period. Principal payments commenced on July 1, 2015. Interest on amounts borrowed were at the Corporation's option, at a rate based on the London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) plus 3% or the bank's base rate (the highest of the prime interest rate or the federal funds effective rate plus .50% or a daily rate equal to one-month LIBOR plus 1.0%) plus 2%. Interest on borrowings on the tax-exempt delayed draw term loan were at 65% of the rate on the taxable delayed draw term loan.

At December 31, 2020, the Corporation was required to make monthly principal payments on the tax-exempt term loan and the taxable term loan of \$7,034 and \$58,037, respectively, increasing annually at a rate of approximately 3% on July 1, plus interest at a floating rate. Borrowings on the tax-exempt term loan and the taxable term loan were subject to interest rates of 3.59% and 5.52%, respectively, at December 31, 2020.

#### Covenants

Under the terms of its bond agreements, the Corporation was required to maintain compliance with certain covenants. The Corporation was not in compliance with these covenants as June 30, 2020 and through December 31, 2020. As of April 29, 2021, the Corporation has received a forbearance agreement from its lenders waiving the event of default through December 31, 2021. These covenants were terminated when the respective bonds were paid off during 2021. The 2021 bond refinance includes debt covenants, which will be effective after Quarter Ending March 31, 2022.

#### Direct Placement Debt - Commercial Mortgage Loan

In May 2019, the Corporation entered into a \$2,200,000 commercial mortgage loan with a bank. Amounts drawn under the terms of this loan were used to pay the costs associated with capital improvements at Batavia Downs. All amounts outstanding under the terms of these agreements were collateralized by certain branches of the Corporation.

The Corporation was required to make monthly principal payments on the commercial mortgage loan in the amount of \$65,701, including interest at the three-year FHLB rate plus 2.15%, with a floor of 3.00%. Borrowings on the commercial mortgage loan were subject to interest at a rate of 4.66% at December 31, 2020. This loan was repaid during 2021.

#### 10. PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM ARRANGEMENT

#### **Direct Borrowing**

In April 2020, the Corporation entered into an arrangement with a bank under the auspices of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) established by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief & Economic Security Act (CARES Act) through which the Corporation received \$3,151,700. This arrangement is evidenced by a loan agreement that includes provisions whereby the loan balance can be fully or partially forgiven based on the Corporation's use of the funds, maintenance of its personnel complement, and compliance with certain reporting elements to the Bank in accordance with the requirements of the PPP Program.

As authorized by Section 1106 of the CARES Act, the U.S. Small Business Administration remitted the full amount of forgiveness on the PPP loan of \$3,151,700. This remittance has paid the loan in full as of June 28, 2021.

#### 11. INTEREST RATE SWAP AGREEMENT

#### **Objectives**

The Corporation entered into an interest rate swap agreement with a bank in order to mitigate the risk of the variable interest rate on the \$17,400,000 term loan for the period October 15, 2013 through October 1, 2023. The ultimate objective of the interest rate swap contract was to obtain a fixed interest payment on this loan at 4.005%. This rate was intended to be a lower interest rate than the Corporation could have obtained by issuing fixed-rate debt. The swap was terminated in 2021 in connection with the refinancing of the Corporation's debt.

#### **Hedge Effectiveness**

The Corporation used the consistent critical terms method to evaluate the hedge effectiveness of the interest rate swap agreement. This method evaluated effectiveness by qualitative consideration of the hedgeable item (variable-rate debt) and the hedging derivative instrument (interest rate swap). Under the consistent critical terms method, if the critical terms of the hedgeable item and the hedging derivative instrument are the same, or similar, the changes in cash flows of the hedging derivative instrument will offset substantially the changes in cash flows of the hedgeable item. The Corporation considered the interest rate swap contract to be effective due to the fact that the changes in cash flow from the interest rate swap substantially offset the changes in price of the variable-rate debt and there was no cash transaction at the inception of the contract.

The fair value of the interest rate swap was estimated using a proprietary pricing service, which considers the assumptions used to estimate fair value to be proprietary information and declines to make such information available.

#### **Credit Risk**

At December 31, 2020 the Corporation was not exposed to credit risk because the interest rate swap had a negative fair value. There was no credit risk at December 31, 2021 as the swap was no longer in place.

#### **Interest Rate Risk**

The Corporation was exposed to interest rate risk on its interest rate swap. On its pay-fixed, receive-variable interest rate swap, as LIBOR decreased, the Corporation's net payment increased.

#### **Basis Risk**

At December 31, 2020 the Corporation was not exposed to basis risk because the variable payment received from the counterparty was determined on the same basis used to calculate the floating rate for the associated notes. At December 31, 2021, there was no basis risk as the swap was no longer in place.

#### **Termination Risk**

Either the Corporation or its counterparty could have terminated the hedging derivative instrument, if the other party failed to perform under the terms of the contract. Termination would have resulted in the Corporation being required to make a termination payment. No such payment was required.

#### Rollover Risk

The Corporation was exposed to rollover risk on the interest rate swap because the interest rate swap contract was scheduled to terminate prior to the maturity of the hedged debt. There is no rollover risk at December 31, 2021 as the swap was no longer in place.

## **Hedging Derivative Instrument Payments and Hedged Debt**

At December 31, 2020 the Corporation's estimated aggregate debt service requirements of the Corporation's variable-rate debt and net receipts/payments on the associated hedging derivative instrument (interest rate swap) was not estimable due to the uncertainties of the total debt principal and the amount hedged.

#### 12. RETIREMENT PLANS

#### New York State and Local Employees' Retirement System (ERS)

ERS is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit retirement system. ERS provides retirement benefits, as well as death and disability benefits. The net position of ERS is held in the New York State Common Retirement Fund (the Fund), which was established to hold all net position and record changes in plan net position allocated to ERS. Obligations of employers and employees to contribute and benufits to employees are governed by the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law (NYSRSSL). Once a public employee elects to participate in ERS, the election is irrevocable. The New York State Constitution provides that the pension membership is a contractual relationship and plan benefits cannot be diminished or impaired. Benefits can be changed for future members only by enactment of a state statute. As set forth in the NYSRSSL, the Comptroller of the State of New York (Comptroller) serves as the sole trustee and administrative head of ERS. The Comptroller adopts and amends rules and regulations for the administration and transaction of the business of ERS and for the custody and control of its funds. ERS provides publicly available financial reports that include financial statements and required supplementary information. The ERS report may be obtained by writing to the New York State and Local Retirement Systems, 110 State Street, Albany, NY 12244.

Under the authority of the NYSRSSL, the Comptroller certifies annually the actuarially determined rates expressed as proportions of payroll of members, which are used to compute the contributions required to be made by employers to the pension accumulation fund. The employee contribution rates are based on ERS membership dates as follows:

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Corporation recognized a net pension liability of \$42,612 and \$10,969,578, respectively, for its proportionate share of the ERS net pension liability. The Corporation's proportionate share of the net pension liability was consistent with the manner in which contributions to the pension plan are determined. The ERS net pension liability was measured as of March 31, 2021 and 2020 and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date.

At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Corporation's proportionate share of ERS was 0.0427939% and 0.0414250% respectively.

For the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Corporation recognized pension expense of \$979,119 and \$3,686,585 related to ERS.

#### **Discount Rate**

The discount rates used to calculate the total pension liabilities was 5.9% at December 31, 2021 and 6.8% at December 31, 2020. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members will be made at the current contribution rates and the contributions from employers will be made at statutorily required rates, actuarially determined. Based upon the assumptions, the Plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

#### **Amortization of Contributions**

Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2010 of the State of New York allows local employers to amortize a portion of their retirement bill for 10 years in accordance with the following stipulations:

- For SFY 2010-11, the amount in excess of the graded rate of 9.5% of employees' covered pensionable salaries, with the first payment of those pension costs not due until the fiscal year succeeding that fiscal year in which the amortization was instituted.
- For subsequent State fiscal years, the graded rate will increase or decrease by up to 1% depending on the gap between the increase or decrease in the System's average rate and the graded rate.
- For subsequent State fiscal years in which the System's average rates are lower than the graded rates, the
  employer will be required to pay the graded rate. Any additional contributions made will be first used to
  pay off existing amortizations, and then any excess will be deposited into a reserve account and will be
  used to offset future increases in contribution rates.

In accordance with these provisions, the Corporation elected to amortize \$820,338 and \$707,411 of the amount due on February 1, 2014 and 2013, respectively, related to the Plan years ending March 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively, over a 10-year period. Amounts amortized over these periods bear interest at 3.76% and 3.00% for the contributions that were due in 2014 and 2013, respectively.

These laws require participating employers to make payments on a current basis, while amortizing existing unpaid amounts relating to the System's fiscal years when the local employer opts to participate in the program.

#### **Section 457 Deferred Compensation Plan**

Employees of the Corporation may elect to participate in the New York State Public Employees Deferred Compensation Plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. The plan is available to all employees and permits the employee to defer a portion of his or her salary until future years, usually after retirement. The value of the plan is not required to be reported in the accompanying financial statements. The Corporation does not contribute to the plan.

#### WNYHHA Retirement Plan

The Corporation has an agreement with the WNYHHA whereby the Corporation contributes \$25,000 to the WNYHHA's retirement plan, in addition to an additional \$25,000 that is retained from the racing purses. These contributions were made in both 2021 and 2020. The Corporation does not maintain the WNYHHA retirement plan assets.

#### 13. OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

#### **Plan Description**

The Corporation provides certain health insurance benefits to retired employees. The Corporation administers the Western Regional Off-Track Betting Corporation Postretirement Health Care Benefits Plan (the Plan) as a single-employer defined benefit other postemployment benefit plan (OPEB).

In 1995, the Corporation's Board of Directors approved the Plan, which was revised in 2000, to provide eligible retiring employees and members of the Board of Directors (collectively, the participants) with medical and health insurance plan coverage under either of two options - Option (or Option II. Eligible participants must meet age, retirement, and years of service and option selection criteria under each option.

#### Eligibility

Individuals eligible to participate under Option I must have a minimum service of five full-time years. Under this option, participants are eligible to receive fully paid health insurance for a period of one year for every two years of service, if retirement occurs at age 55 with ten years of service. Participants with less than ten years of service will be required to contribute 5% of the premium for each year pre-dating the ten years.

Individuals eligible to participate under Option II must meet a minimum age requirement of 55 years and have ten consecutive, full-time years of service. Under this option, participants are eligible to receive fully paid health insurance until their death, if their years of service and age total 70. Participants electing Option II, who have not, in combination, reached an age of 70 are required to contribute 5% towards the premium for each year pre-dating the combination of 70.

#### **Funding Policy**

The obligations of the Plan are established by action of the Corporation pursuant to applicable employment and collective bargaining agreements and can be amended. The required premium contribution rates of the retirees are dependent on the Option in which they participate.

The Corporation currently contributes enough money to the Plan to satisfy current obligations on a pay-as-you-go basis. The costs of administering the Plan are paid by the Corporation. No assets are accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria of GASB 75, paragraph 4.

#### 14. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

#### **Tote Services**

The Corporation has an agreement with its tote vendor, United Tote, to provide services and computer equipment for its branch, ITW operations, and live racing through March 2023. In 2021 and 2020, the agreement required the Corporation to pay an amount equal to 0.5% of handle for branch, ITW, and live racing, or an annual minimum of \$621,000, including the \$50,000 marketing package. Computer rental expense in 2021 and 2020 was approximately \$650,000 and \$532,000, respectively.

Under the terms of this agreement, the annual minimum payment, including the \$50,000 marketing package increases to \$635,000 in 2022.

In January 2013, the Corporation entered into a new lease agreement with United Tote for additional communication equipment. Effective July of 2017, the terms of this lease were amended to require annual payments of through March 2023.

The Corporation has an agreement with another tote vendor, Amtote, to merge the Corporation's off-track betting pools with on-track betting pools at four tracks located within NYS and various out-of-state tracks utilized by the Corporation. The expense under the terms of this agreement was approximately \$56,000 and \$49,000 in 2021 and 2020, respectively.

The Corporation also has an agreement with a third tote vendor, Global Tote US, LLC, to merge the Corporation's off-track betting pools with on-track betting pools at tracks located within NYS and various out-of-state tracks utilized by the Corporation. This agreement is cancelable by either party, with thirty-day advance notice, at the end of any calendar year. Payments are 0.163% of handle at those tracks and were approximately \$25,000 and \$19,000 in 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### Other

The Corporation has entered into agreements with certain NYS and out-of-state racetracks to receive live telecasts of their races at the Corporation's branches. The satellite uplink services agreements provide for fees of \$287,783 annually, for the time period May 1, 2021 through April 30, 2026. Total costs for satellite uplink services were \$246,457 and \$250,000 in 2021 and 2020 respectively. Communications network fees for 2021 were negotiated at \$42,486 and will continue to decrease going forward. Total losts for communications network fees were \$42,486 in 2021 and \$106,477 in 2020.

The Corporation has entered into agreements with certain service providers to receive custodial services. Expense recognized under the terms of these agreements was approximately \$165.000 and \$177,000 in 2021 and 2020, respectively.

#### 15. SELF-INSURANCE

#### **Risk Retention**

The Corporation is exposed to various risk of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injured employees; and natural disasters. The Corporation has elected to be self-insured for workers' compensation claims. Claim expenses and liabilities are reported when it is probable that a loss has occurred, and the amount of that loss can be reasonably estimated.

At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the amount of these liabilities were \$404,434 and \$53,000, respectively. The liability is the Corporation's best estimate based on available information provided by the third-party administrators.

#### 16. COVID-19

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies.
